

WELCOME TO BLACK HISTORY MONTH 2023!

Since 2001, Black History Month in Scotland has grown into the busy and varied month of events that it is today. Rooted in the solidarity of the anti-racist movement, Black History Month encompasses the histories of African, Caribbean and Asian people in Scotland, people who often have a direct link with Scotland through slavery, colonialism and migration. Black History Month is a time to focus on the sacrifices, contributions and achievements of these communities, bringing people together to offer a space for reflection and learning. We also use this month to acknowledge the structural racism and white supremacy of the past, and the ways in which Black people continue to be subject to this violence today.

Since the murder of George Floyd in 2020, the Black Lives Matter movement has led to much activism including commitments made by public bodies to a range of anti-racist actions. At CRER in the past year we published our report 'Do Black Lives Still Matter in Scotland?' looking at the progress and failings on these commitments. The report argues that research and responses from organisations into their historical ties to slavery and colonialism must "incorporate action to address the present-day racism and discrimination faced by Black/minority ethnic people in living in Scotland". We reiterate this call to action. Black History Month is a campaign point and springboard from which the often hidden and unacknowledged histories must become part of the narrative of Scotland (and part of our museums, education system and culture). We must ensure that acknowledgement of the contributions and resilience of Black and minority ethnic communities is properly interwoven with lasting anti-racism action across Scotland.

CRER has had the privilege of working in collaboration with voluntary, community and public sector groups to come together and create an exciting range of events including exhibitions, talks, tours, workshops and film screenings. There's even the chance to try food during a culinary celebration, amongst the 80 or so events on offer.

We want to extend a thank you to all the organisations and individuals who have contributed their events and to express our gratitude for their continued support, without which Black History Month would not be possible. Thank you to <u>Malini Chakrabarty</u> for designing this year's Black History Month programme cover art.

Most events are free, with details on how to sign up for them in the programme and on the Black History Month website. Come along and join us in celebrating Black History Month 2023!




TRACING GLASGOW'S IMPERIAL PAST IN KELVINGROVE PARK
